Partisanship (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Democrat

The following six attributes appear in a random order with randomly selected levels.

Platform: Elections (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Opposes new legislation to require voters to show state-issued ID at the polls.
- Supports new legislation to require voters to show state-issued ID at the polls.

Platform: Investigations (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Said law enforcement investigations of politicians and their associates should be free of partisan influence.
- Said elected officials should supervise law enforcement investigations of politicians and their associates.

Platform: Compromise (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Promises to work for compromise across party lines.
- Promises to stand up to the other party.

Platform: Courts (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Said elected officials must obey the courts even when they think that the decisions are wrong.
- Said elected officials should not be bound by court decisions they regard as politicized.

Platform: Discrimination (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Believes the government should do more to prevent discrimination against racial minorities.
- Believes discrimination against racial minorities is less of a problem now than in the past.

Platform: Limited government (uniform weight, 0.5 each)

- Wants to raise taxes on the wealthy.
- Wants to lower taxes on everyone, including the wealthy.

Notes

- The order of attributes in the conjoint table is such that name is always the first attribute, partisanship is the second attribute, and the six other attributes are presented in a random order after the top two.
- The conjoint table should have 9 rows and 2 columns. The first row always says “Candidate 1” on the left and “Candidate 2” on the right, both in bold or emphasized in some way, and the 8 levels for each attribute appear below the labels. There is **no** column that shows the attribute names/categories (i.e., “Name,” “Partisanship,” “Platform: Compromise,” etc.); but see final note, because the attribute names should still be included in the data.
- All levels of all attributes are randomly generated. For all attributes except “Name,” the levels appear with equal probability (50% each). For the “Name” attribute, “white-sounding” names show up 60% of the time (~1.3% for each name), “black-sounding” names show up 20% of the time (~0.57% for each name), and “Hispanic-sounding” names show up 20% of the time (~0.47% for each name). There are 44 “white-sounding” names in our list, 35 “black-sounding names”, and 41 “Hispanic-sounding” names for a total of 123 levels.
- Each respondent evaluates 10 pairs of candidates with randomly generated attributes. There are no constraints on which attributes and levels can show up together, and respondents may see profiles with the same level for a given attribute multiple times (even in the same conjoint table).
- Each conjoint table (which includes two hypothetical candidates with randomly generated attributes) appears on its own page (page breaks between tables) with the question asking respondents to choose between the two candidates directly below the conjoint table (on the same page).
- Responses to the question asking respondents to choose between the two candidates should be requested rather than forced. If a respondent tries to click to the next pair of profiles without answering the question, they should be reminded that they have not answered the question (i.e., “There is one unanswered question on this page. Would you like to continue?” with response options “Continue without answering” and “Answer the question”) or something similar. Only if respondents “Continue without answering” are they able to skip questions.
- There is no “back” button to allow respondents to change their answers after clicking to the next table.
- Data will be provided in a format such that each row is a respondent, and there is a column for each attribute category that appeared in a given table (i.e., “Partisanship”

even though the word “Partisanship” did not appear to respondents in the table), the level of the attribute that appeared for the first hypothetical candidate in a given table (i.e., “Democrat” or “Republican”), and the level of the attribute that appeared for the for the second hypothetical candidate in a given table (i.e., “Democrat” or “Republican”). **For just the data related to the conjoint,** this should be a total of 240 columns: (1 attribute category + 2 levels) x 8 attributes in each conjoint table x 10 tables. All other question responses should show up in their own column, including those that ask respondents to choose between candidates.
